St Paul's Bells

Philip Lewis reports: St Pauløs bells became progressively more difficult to ring from the mid-1990s. Work in 2000 achieved some improvement but under the new Surveyor to the Fabric a full restoration is in hand.

Canons on bells 1 to 8 have been removed and Taylors of Loughborough are providing modern headstocks, calibrated to achieve best results. The bells are being cleaned and 140 years of grime removed. The frame is being strengthened under the direction of the Cathedral Engineer. The bells will not be re-tuned, although cleaning may improve their tone.

The internal route used to install the bells was ruled out, so the bells were extracted using a lifting beam supported by scaffolding on the outside of the tower, a spectacular sight, attracting much interest from tourists and City workers.

Plans are to restart ringing by late October and to hold a re-dedication service on 1st November, the 140th anniversary of the original dedication.

Costs have been met entirely by charitable donations, mostly from the City bodies which funded the bells originally, the BRF, individual ringers and other ringing charities - a total of over £420,000. The St Pauløs Chapter and community have expressed sincere thanks to all these supporters.

S&W 6-Bell Striking Competition

Mike Wigney reports: 6 teams took part in this yearøs competition, which was held on 3rd June in hot sunshine at Cranford, judged by Steve Jakeman, Angela McLellan and Debbie Malin. Results were 1. *Chiswick, 2 Staines,* 3. *Hillingdon*, followed by *Twickenham S, Acton* and *Twickenham O.*

Bell Restoration

Stephen Jakeman, Bell Restoration officer, writes: The BRF exists to provide money to assist in necessary maintenance and improvement work. I hold a collection of stays, sliders, and much else, and Iøm always ready to provide advice and guidance and assist where needed in organising remedial work.

A number of important maintenance jobs are progressing. Acton (wheels, and the bearings of the 4th), Hampstead and St George-inthe-East (re-bushed clappers), and Kilburn St Augustine (stay replacements). At Homerton (a 3-bell 5cwt anticlockwise ring) the distance boards on the baldrick clappers were so worn that one bell actually fell silent during a recent wedding, now repaired. Harlingtonøs bells are on holiday in Dorset, being refurbished by Nicholsons of Bridport. No. 7 is being welded to repair cracks caused by removal of the iron staples.

Thanks to Janet Betham for yet again organising a stall at the Highgate Fair in June. Janet and helpers raised over £300 for the BRF. Well done!

London Ringing Summer School

Information from James White The second Summer School took place for a week at the end of July. Organised by Louise Booth, James White, Stephanie Pattenden and Tue Sando it was based at St Mary Abbots, Kensington where the training bells were invaluable.

The course was funded by a community grant of £1,000 from Aviva and fees of $\pounds75$ each from the 12 students. Noting feedback from last year, the committee arranged that at least 50% of the studentsøtime was spent in the tower. Excellent talks were given by Sam Cave on theory, Paul Flavell on history, and Clyde Whittaker on essential listening skills. With an entertaining and informative tower session with Steve Jakeman on bell maintenance, and wide-ranging talks from Simon Meyer and Alan Regin MBE, on Ringing Remembers, the students were inspired to see ringing in its full context.

The course aimed to secure recruits likely to continue ringing, and to tutor them to be able to ring rounds. A rollcall of very experienced ringers volunteered to teach, supported by helpers and Saturday follow-up sessions are arranged. Results will be carefully assessed against the course objectives. Half-day Outing Bedford Bells

Janet Drake writes: Nine of us from the N&E District had an enjoyable half-day outing in Bedford. We were made welcome at St. Andrews, St Peter de Merton. and St Pauløs. This last is a 12 bell tower, so even with help from a friendly local ringer we had to leave two bells unrung.

Interesting churches, particularly St. Peterøs with part of the tower dating back to Saxon times. After our efforts we had a pleasant drink overlooking the river Great Ouse. Few, if any of us had rung at Bedford before. It was just a pity there were not more of us to enjoy the experience.

(For those of you who are sailors or boaters, we were told you could take a boat from Bedford to Ely and beyond - now thereøs a thought!)

Recruitment

The effort to recruit new ringers is reaching its peak. The Ringing Remembers project set a target of 1,400 recruits, the number of ringers killed in WW1. By the start of July well over 1,000 new ringers had been identified and drawn in to the Exercise, many motivated by the opportunity to ring in memory of a relative killed in the war.

The Summer School students are all either already in touch with a home tower or have been given contact details. All towers have been encouraged to welcome where possible recruits referred to them.

Stephen Mitchell, Association Secretary, reported on 18th August: Just in the last week or so I have processed about 40 expressions of interest in learning to ring, or returning to ring, generated by national publicity. Over the last year I must have received around 75 overall. Most of these were sent to me by -Ringing Remembersø Some came direct to me via the Middlesex Association website.

I respond to individuals, linking them to the most appropriate towers for their post-codes, and copying my emails to a local contact asking them to contact the prospective ringers. Some (not all) copy me into the next steps.

As Secretary I am not in a position to follow up each referral, unfortunately, and it remains to be seen how many go on to become Middlesex ringers.

Learning lessons

Jamie Singleton, 'Ringing Remembers' coordinator with the Big Ideas company writes: I started in my role as Ringing Remembers Campaign Coordinator with little previous knowledge of ringing, but I decided to give it a go, learning at Foster Lane with Tom Lawrance and really enjoying it!

Ringing lets me switch off stress and focus on ringing but I struggle with impatience! I still cannot control the bell fully and ring how I would wish. Managing this slow progress is important for retaining new learners, but this is also one of the great things about it; it is not easy to do and the sense of reward and achievement is big.

Since I have been learning I have asked many friends and acquaintances for their perceptions of ringing. There is a mix of responses, but I find that bell ringing can sometimes be perceived as a bit unusual, old-fashioned and perhaps only for people who are religious. I feel these preconceptions can be a barrier for many potential ringers.

Entering this new world takes a certain amount of bravery, particularly for those who are not acquainted with churches, and the welcome from existing ringers can make a big difference for new learners.
