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### Well done, Wigneys!

Prudence Fay writes: Congratulations to both Jill and Mike Wigney on recent milestones. Since taking to his wheelchair in 2002, Mike has scored his **1,000<sup>th</sup> tower-bell QP**: 1320 of Merton Delight Minor at Colliers Wood on 16 February, which he called. This is a record that's unlikely to be broken any time soon!

On Thursday 9 February, Jill rang her **100<sup>th</sup> hand-bell peal for the MCA** — 5024 Yorkshire Surprise Major, on 5-6, called by James Smith.

*Jill writes*: I would like to dedicate my peal to Roger Bailey, who was such an inspiration, and gave me guidance and so much chance to progress, and with whom I rang 37 of those peals. I gave up tower-bell peal ringing in 2007, due to arthritic wrists and dizziness; and handbell ringing has since become a passion, and enabled me to continue to ring peals.

#### Details of the MCA's AGM

# Ringing, friendship, and music

Jo Dorling writes: On one of the coldest January days of this year, it was a pleasure to be at Christ Church, Hampstead, for the N&E District's Social -- a delightful **evening of musical entertainment**.

It opened with trumpetplaying by Alec Gray. A string player myself, I enjoyed being reminded of what a beautiful and commanding tone the trumpet can produce. It's always nerve-racking to open a concert, a bit like ringing first in a striking competition! Alec, Handel, and Haydn, provided an assured opening, and we knew at once we were in for an excellent evening.

Delights followed: Michael Royalton-Kisch on the organ; then Caroline Stockmann on the flute, accompanied by Ruth Darton on the piano. Characterful and amusing madrigals, followed by audience participation, rounded off the first half. In the interval, there was a cheerful bringand-share supper.

The second half began with music on handbells by the Hackney ringers. I tried tuneringing more years ago than I care to remember, and it's not as easy as they made it seem. Spell-binding guitar-playing from Sam Cave revealed what a sophisticated, versatile instrument the guitar is. It was followed by Beethoven's *Ghost Trio Sonata*, with Ruth Atkinson (violin), Elizabeth Atkinson (cello), and Michael Royalton-Kisch (piano).

Finally, you couldn't have asked for a more beautiful item to close with than the soprano Penny Sharpe, accompanied by Ruth Corney, singing songs and arias from Puccini, Schubert, and Mozart. I just didn't want the fantastic evening to end!

Raffle and tickets raised a superb £758 for the BRF. Thanks to all the performers, especially Michael Royalton-Kisch, whose inspiration and dedication brought it all to be.

She was a member of the Association for more than 60 years, held all its major offices, was a Trustee for many years; and still a Vice-President. She was Ringing Master at Hendon 1953-2000, where she taught more than 100 people to ring. Her funeral will be at Hendon on 3 March.

#### Keeping the bells ringing

Stephen Jakeman writes: The main project supported recently by the BRF with a grant of £5K was the restoration of the ring at **Southwark Cathedral**, which has had major publicity (press, TV, *RW*). The General Secretary, Stephen Mitchell, attended the service for the blessing of the returned bells in January.

Work has started at **Great Stanmore**, and is likely to be one of Whitechapel's last contracts. The treble, 2<sup>nd</sup>, and tenor are now out of the tower. Whitechapel are also undertaking work at **St Giles in the Fields** to modify the clappers, and hopefully make the bells easier to strike. A grant application has been received from St Giles, and will be considered at the BRC meeting in March.

Both this, and a grant application from **St Paul's Cathedral** towards its restoration project, have been received by the BRF, and any proposed grants will be voted on at the AGM. An appeal for the St Paul's project (£360,000) was formally launched on 9 November at a service in St Paul's attended by the Master, Geraldine Forster, and by myself as Bell Restoration Officer.

# News from the District ADMs

Mike Wigney writes: The S&W's Annual District Meeting was held on 7 January at Fulham, attended by about 30 people, and with Peter Kemp in the chair. There was general ringing beforehand. In the elections held at the meeting all the officers were re-elected, with the exception of two who stood down: John Manley as Training Officer, and John Barrance as BRC Rep. Roger Forster was elected to be a Training Officer, and Richard Jones as BRC Rep.

Janet Drake reports: The **N&E's Annual District Meeting** was held at Edgware on 18 February with Margaret Peirce in the chair, and 23 members attending. Alec Gray stood down as Ringing Master, and Stephen Jakeman was elected, with 4 Assistant Ringing Masters: Martin Sutcliffe, Helen Porter, Martin Clode and Jinny Kufluk. Helen Porter stood down as Training Officer, and Angela McLellan was elected in her place. All other District officers were re-elected.

#### The ART of teaching

Lucy Chandial writes: Clyde Whittaker, as a Training Rep for the N&E district, organised a day with Pip Penney of ART (the Association of Ringing Teachers), to introduce several N&E officers and interested others to the Learn the Ropes scheme, and the Module 1 techniques for teaching bell-handling. It was hosted by St Margaret's, Uxbridge.

I had previously attended the Module 1 course on learning to teach bell-handling, so was interested to see how this version, devised to promote

thought among the N&E officers, would compare. We covered essentially the same syllabus, with a mixture of presentation and practical. The presentations focused on how people learn, what teaching handling can learn from sports-coaching techniques, and how our way of learning won't necessarily work for all novices. Explaining proven techniques, and considering the difference between teaching an auditory and a visual learner, showed that academic rigour has been applied to creating ART's teachertraining scheme.

Exercises, such as keeping control of the handstroke as your learner takes in rope while ringing down, were an opportunity to check our own ability to explain a task and to give feedback effectively. Some attendees had been teaching bell-handling for many years, some of us have never taught this first step, but everyone learnt something new.

We concluded the day by agreeing that we'd like to use the Learn the Ropes scheme at the Summer School (see page 3) and at handling masterclasses planned for this year, as well as in many of our towers. Pip's enthusiasm for applying thought-through techniques to address a learner's needs, and the thoroughness of the Learn the Ropes scheme, gave us confidence that adopting them would help us to teach happy and well-prepared learners.

### A Grand(sire) day out

James White writes: Saturday 28 January was declared to be London Grandsire Day, and a group of 13 ringers attempted — and scored — quarter-peals of Grandsire from Maximus down to Doubles, as a group of Somerset ringers did two years ago.

Two quarter peals were rung at each of four towers in the City, starting just after 9 a.m. and finishing at 8 p.m., 10,544 changes later. At St Magnus the Martyr, 12 ringers rang both Grandsire Maximus and Grandsire Cinques. The Cinques required a restart after a mis-call rather a long way through, putting the project close on an hour late thereafter. The Royal and Caters followed, at St Dunstan in the West. Then we moved on to St James Garlickhythe for Major and Triples.

The core band of six, who had been involved from the start, ended at St Katharine Cree for the Minor (which we thought the best ringing of the day) and Doubles. Both were without incident, and we retired to a local hostelry for rehydration, with satisfaction. The same ringer rang the treble throughout, and the same conductor called all eight quarter peals (ringing "n-1" throughout) with compositions all of different (even) lengths. and this is duly happening in August, from Monday 21 to Friday 25. It will be based in St Mary Abbots, Kensington, where the tower has excellent training facilities, including dumb-bells partly funded by the MCA.

Each day will run from 10 to 4, and will include handling lessons on tower bells, handbell ringing, some history of ringing, and change-ringing theory. We will aim to introduce each learner to a home tower contact during the week, and hope they will be ready to start ringing there after the course. It will cost around £50 per learner (with possible support, if required). #### All ears

Lindsav Wakeman writes: A **Listening Skills Training** event was hosted on 28 January at St Margaret's, Uxbridge (thanks, Alan Rix), in an upstairs room, with refreshments available all day. Some 20 students took part in four sessions — two desk-based and two practicals. In the morning, Clyde Whittaker introduced the importance of listening, using a series of CCCBR recordings in which we had to pick out the errant bells and describe their faults. We learned the best way to pick out striking faults, and over the morning were able to hone our skills to hearing just a 10% error in rounds on 6! After a brief lunch break, we reconvened in two groups to alternate between ringing on real bells at St Andrew's nearby, and on a simulator

in St Margaret's. The practical tower session (with Mike Bale) provided a good opportunity to listen to our own striking problems! As Mike said, without proper bell control we are hardly in a favourable position to correct our striking, and he had helpful pointers for correcting handling, and modifying speed.

The simulator practical was led by Roger Booth. Two of St Margaret's bells were connected to the simulators, and we each had a chance (wearing headphones) to cover to rounds or a method, with a graphical view of our errors and scores. This was harder than I thought! Back, then, to the final exercises with Clyde, this time with real bells ringing methods. Picking out the striking problems was tricky, but definitely trained the ears.

Thanks to all the organisers for a well-packed day smoothly run, enjoyable, and very useful. Recommended!

### Notable achievement

*Peter Blight writes*: A first for the Middlesex was scored on 23 December, when an MCA **peal was rung at the Queen's Tower, Imperial College**, by a band that contained five present or past MCA officers. The peal, of 5151 Stedman Caters, composed and conducted by Lucinda Woodward, was both the longest peal (number of changes) rung so far at the Queen's Tower, and also the quickest (3hr 27 min).

It was rung in remembrance of all regular Queen's Tower ringers no longer with us, notably the MCA stalwarts Jack Crampion, Clive Buswell, Stan Mason, Dennis Randall, Roger Bailey, and Fred Ellis.
