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Headlines from the AGM

Stephen Mitchell, General Secretary, writes: The MCA's Annual General Meeting was held in the church hall of St Stephen's, Rochester Row, in Westminster, on 22 April, giving MCA members a chance to ring on the refurbished and rehung bells. The Association had contributed towards funding this work, and the bells are now much easier to ring.

At the meeting, the 200 Club draw for the annual prize of £1,000 was made, and the winner was Catherine Newton, Fiona Clode's mother. Ginny Johnson and South Hackney tower won the prizes of £50.

Geraldine Forster was elected President, on completing her three-year term as Master; and John Manley was elected as the new Master. Clyde Whittaker was voted in as Training Officer; and the Central Council Reps for 2017-20 are Linda Foddering and Clyde Whittaker. Vacancies remain for another two Reps. All the other officers were re-elected.

The Bell Restoration Committee proposed two grants. The meeting approved the first — \pounds 3,000 to St Giles in the Fields for work on the clappers; and it approved an amendment from the floor to the second proposal, granting St Paul's Cathedral £12,000 towards the major refurbishment of its ring of 12.

The 8-bell Inter-District Striking Competition for the Roger Bailey Cup was held at St Saviour's, Pimlico, before

the AGM. The test piece was Grandsire Triples, and Paul and Kate Flavell judged the contest. They placed the bands as follows: *1 S&W* (conducted by James White); 2 N&E (conducted by Stephen Jakeman); 3 N&E (conducted by Martin Clode); 4 S&W (conducted by Mike Palmer).

Philip's bell

Alan Regin writes: For the past few years we have been remembering ringers who died in the Great War, and ringing on the anniversaries of their deaths. We have also planned to hang a ring of 8 bells in St George's church in Ypres, Belgium, which is the focal point of remembrance for the fallen, and these are now being cast. The project was very close to the heart of Philip Vracas, who died in 2016, and the treble is to be dedicated to him. The inscription on one side will read:

Vracas, 1959-2016, Trustee

On the other side will be:

For a soldier of the Great War known unto God

together with a cross that is the same as those on the war graves, which have a flaring tip at the ends of the upright and the cross bar.

The bell is scheduled to be cast on Thursday 15 June, and the ring will travel to Ypres (now called leper) during the early part of September. There are then likely to be 2 events,

so as many people as possible can attend: one dedicating the bells on the church floor, and the other when the bells are in the tower. When the dates are confirmed, I'll let you know.

Taylor's is to hold an **Open Day at the Foundry** in Loughborough on Saturday 29 July, open to all. One of the items on view will be the completed Ypres ring in its frame.

St Mary's scores its century

Stephen Mitchell writes: On Sunday 30 April 2017, with a peal of Yorkshire Surprise Major rung by a Middlesex County Association band, St Mary's, Twickenham, became the latest tower in south-west Middlesex to register 100 peals. This century took the best part of three centuries to accumulate since the first peal on 22 January 1733. Nearby Isleworth, meanwhile, has already been pealed 100 times; and the historic, relocated ring of 10 at All Hallows', Twickenham, has been rung to 124 peals since 1951.

St Mary's slower pace is not surprising, given its riverside location, in the middle of the town, surrounded by shops, restaurants, pubs, and houses. There is frequent wedding ringing; and the bells are quite loud, even when enjoyed over a pint in the adjacent Eel Pie! So we were pleased by a fairly positive reaction to the bells' being rung for 3hrs 4mins on a sunny Sunday afternoon.

St Mary's bells are quite a mixture: the oldest (6^{th}) was cast by John Saunders around 1545; one dates from 1695; three from the early 18^{tth} century; and the tenor (18cwt) was recast by Taylors in 1887.

In the 18th century, the bells were rung to two lengths of more than 6,000 Plain Bob Major, one of these by The Twickenham Scholars. (Whatever happened to them?) Almost a quarter of the 100 peals have been Grandsire Triples, the latest of these being Holt's Original, called by James White for the MCA in 2002. Surprise Major peals have included 110 Spliced in 1994, and Norman Smith's 23 all-the-work Spliced, which

was called by Andrew Graham for the ASCY in 2009. The band at St Mary's, led by Norman Edwards since the early 1980s, is at present rather depleted, and has no currently active peal ringers.

There goes a stay ...

With the lamented closure of the Whitechapel Foundry, how are ringers quickly to replace a broken stay? Various people are considering this, but meanwhile Stephen Jakeman (07770 387230) has access to a supply of stays, and towers should contact him for the time being, about breakages.

Visit to Verona

Janet Betham writes: I was inspired by an article in *The Ringing World* and had met a representative of the Associazione Suonatori di Campane a Sistema Veronese at the Roadshow in Newbury, so on a recent trip to Naples with my choir I decided to stop off at Verona. I was glad I did. I was met at Verona by the President of the ASCSV, Eles Belfontali, who drove us to Custoza, a village about 20 minutes out of town, where she had assembled 10 enthusiasts to demonstrate their way of ringing, of which they are very proud. They ring the bells up with no sallies, ropes coiling on the floor, and hold them on the balance without a stay, until their number is called by a maestro with a list on a music stand in front of him. He has several of these concerti, and the skill lies in ringing a sequence of numbers on command, sometimes two blows one after the other, and always in the correct rhythm, so intense concentration is needed. Chords can be rung with 2 or 3 bells sounding together; but the numerical

order is not in a circle – which makes ringing rounds more interesting! If you go to their website www.campanesistema veronese.it you can see them ringing Ave Maria, and watch the ringers at work in various churches.

It's well worth visiting them, if you are ever near Verona.

Central Council matters

Linda Foddering writes: I am a MCA Central Council Representative, but sadly will not be at the Annual Meeting in Edinburgh on 29 May, when our own Christopher O'Mahony, who rings at Harrow, will take over from Chris Mew as President. However, our other CCCBR rep, Clyde Whittaker, will be there. He is on the CRAG committee, and will be considering CRAG's proposals for reforming the Central Council. He will then bring us up to date via the ringers' list. He is also on the Public Relations committee, and involved with BBC Music Day on 15 June (see page 1).

Being on the Library committee, I am planning a nationwide peal-board project, asking Associations and/Guilds for information on their peal boards. My mother started this within the MCA 30 years ago; and, Paul Norman, our Librarian, has loaded the details of more than 400 peal-boards in Middlesex towers, which can be found on Flickr.
