12-Bell Contest

Stephen Mitchell writes: On Saturday 27th October the Association entered the London 12-bell competition, ringing Cambridge Surprise Maximus to the Wrong (6 leads finishing with a 12th place lead end). We had no method mistakes at all and thought we had rung well, but the judges considered our striking to have an insufficiently even compass, due mainly to õinconsistent leadingö. With a mark of 62% we came 7th, indicating the demanding standard required; even past winners the St Pauløs band only managed 4th place!



Armistice Centenary

Across the world 3,013 ringing events linked to Ringing Remembers and the Armistice centenary were recorded by Bellboard. The Association played a full part in the commemoration both of those who were killed during four years of war, and of the day when peace was restored. Many towers were able to ring both for the 11 a.m. Armistice Day service, often half muffled, and at 12:30 with open ringing in celebration the coming of peace as encouraged by the British and German governments.

Ringing performances linked to Ringing Remembers ranged from tolling, rounds and callchanges to full peals, as each towergs band decided.

More than 1,400 ringers are known to have been killed in the First World War, and the Central Council set a target of recruiting 1,400 new ringers as part of Ringing Remembers. Over 1,700 ringers have been recruited already. Across the Association towers have experienced an inflow of recruits, many attracted by the Ringing Remembers publicity. Those

Further training

Information from James White Following up the London Bell Ringing Summer School, during the autumn we provided six sessions for the students; these proved very popular.

For the School Louise Booth and I are organising six more practices for any ringers who have recently learnt to handle a bell and who are now ready for rounds. As well as ringing rounds, there will be support to iron out handling issues, leading on to call changes, dodging and place-making.

In tribute to an inspiring man and a great ringer, towers across the Association and more widely rang 15 quarter peals for Dennis, including ± 100 th Birthdayøand $\pm D$ ennis Brock Doublesøat Birchington in Kent. Peals of Plain Bob Minor (St John at Hackney) and of Lincolnshire Surprise Major (Farnsworth and Kearsley) were recorded, and a peal attempt of Yorkshire (Sunbury), together with other shorter performances, were also rung. Many of these tributes included ringers trained by Dennis.

He says that his principle is õNothing is going to get me downö, and that infectious optimism is the attitude he conveys to ringers around him. From a German prison camp during the war, sick and short of food, he identified himself uniquely through the Red Cross to his family with the message õKeep the old bells a-ringingö. He was confident that he would return to do just that. And he did, and he does, ringing a QP of Grandsire Triples on his birthday.

Bell Restoration

Stephen Jakeman, Bell Restoration Officer, writes:

There are currently three projects in progress that have received grants from the Bell Restoration Fund (BRF). That at **St Paul's** is essentially complete (see report page 1), and it was good to see several members of the Association in the congregation for the re-dedication service.

Harlington continues to move forwards and the cracked 7th is now welded. Work has now started at **Acton** to address the dilapidated wheels etc. An inspection at **Bedfont** identified some pieces of work to keep the bells in good condition including re-bushing the 5th clapper. **St John at Hackney** and **St Margaret's Westminster** are now out of action due to planned building works. It is good to hear that **St Andrew's Enfield** are back in action after some temporary works to rectify a failed beam in the roof of the tower.

Sound Control

Anthony Davey writes; Many towers in the Association are now having to take greater account of their neighboursø concerns about noise, and may have to give warnings about practices and QPs. Some are constrained to limit or ban peal attempts. For advice on installing sound control shutters, contact Stephen Jakeman.

The CCCBR recommends that within the ringing room noise levels should not exceed 75dB. Stephen can advise on practical measures to reduce sound. If rope boxes are required to muffle sound penetrating through rope holes, St Anneøs Highgate can offer recent experience of construction and calibration.

St. Andrew's, Enfield Outing

Claude Pehrson writes: On 27th August twelve ringers from St. Andrewøs and three other towers went to the Stour Valley, famous for beautiful country, John Constableøs painting and East Bergholtøs bells.

St. James, Nayland (6, 15 cwt) and St. Mary, Higham (6, 9 cwt) provided contrasting heavy and light rings. St. Mary, Polstead (6, 9cwt) was a ground floor ring that proved to be easy enough to handle, and memorable for the splendid view over the valley.

After a good lunch at the Carrier® Arms in East Bergholt, of course we went to see the bells in their cage. The unfinished tower is still there, and a massive foundation it is.

St. Mary the Virgin, Bures (8, 21cwt) lost its steeple in a major fire in 1733, which melted most of the bells, now hung anti-clockwise. The heavy ring went well, leaving us free to concentrate on looking in the right direction! The local ringers provided very welcome tea afterwards ó our grateful thanks to them.

Ringing ranged from call changes, the usual Doubles Methods, to Stedman Doubles, Little Bob Minor, Cambridge Surprise Minor and Plain Hunt Triples. A fine days outing.

Codicote ART M1

Sonia Field writes:

Seventeen students assembled for an ART Module One course at St Giles Church in Codicote, Hertfordshire. Lesley Boyle was our tutor. The day course covered teaching theory and practical bellhandling, to enable participants to feel confident about teaching learners from scratch.

M1 provides some theory of teaching with emphasis on how it applies to bell-ringing, and all the elements of teaching a complete beginner to handle a bell independently, including ringing up and down. In the practical sessions teaching techniques were

explained and demonstrated. We then practised these skills in groups with coaching from Lesley. We were encouraged to engage in discussion about these activities, (sometimes gaining tips to refine our own handling).

ART Module One is an excellent approach to teaching bellhandling. We really can teach handling from scratch.

A holistic approach to recruitment and training

writes Michael Royalton-Kisch In 2012 the BRF gave St Maryøs, Kilburn a grant towards a ring of six, with the express intention of recruiting and training young ringers. We knew that retaining young recruits might require thinking beyond the constraints of teaching and the belfry to hold their interest. The band should stand alone as a youth enterprise and opportunity should be made available for the students quickly to acquire a sense of ownership and place. So the teaching programme has been weighted in favour of outings, social activities and incentives. Ringers are encouraged to call changes themselves and to develop their teaching skills during regular Sunday morning tied bell sessions, under the learned guidance of university student ringers from UL. It works.

The result? A critical mass of young ringers has been recruited from the congregation, the Sunday School, and friends, and retained. Some are now at university but all continue to ring and teach at Kilburn when home.

Stimulating simulating

Susan Reed writes:

On 24th November eight students met at St Mary Abbots to learn about ringing with simulators, led by Roger Booth, who has been involved with simulator technology from its early days.

Roger showed how simulators, particularly Abel, can be used in teaching and learning to help develop key ringing skills, especially listening. There was also some technical discussion of set-ups and sensors, and a brief review of alternative software, Beltower and Virtual Belfry.

With dumb-bells we faced the challenge of striking well with a simulator. Later we learnt how to set up on the computer different exercises, methods and screen views, and how to review striking (scope for encouraging learner competition thereí!). I for one left inspired to make more use of our simulators, both on my own account and for training current and future learners.

Many thanks are due to Roger, who travelled up from Alresford to run the course, to Clyde Whittaker, and to Stephanie Pattenden, who facilitated use of the tower and dumbells, for a stimulating morning simulating.
