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Getting the wheels turning

Our President, Geraldine Forster writes: Some newer members of the Association have been asking about its structure, what it offers its members and what does the President actually do?

Your Association covers a large area; all of London north of the Thames and the whole of the old County of Middlesex, in two Districts, N&E and S&W. Each district has its own officers (see the website for contacts). The two District Ringing Masters do a lot of work organising local practices, quarter peals and QP days, and striking competition bands. The Training Officers organise courses within their District ó always willing to arrange training on request. Ask them !

The Association Officers look after the finances, publicity, peal recording, membership, bell restoration, insurance and many other issues. They also run the ringing when the whole Association comes together ó usually at the AGM and Autumn General Meeting.

The Association Ringing Master, David Bassford, runs the monthly 12-bell practice at St Magnus-the-Martyr and organises the bands for the annual Service of Ordination at St Pauløs Cathedral, the London 12-bell Competition and the Essex Trophy. Some of you met him helping beginners at last yearøs Summer School. The Association Training Officer, Clyde Whittaker, coordinates training for the whole Association.

And what does the President do? Having spent three years hard graft as Association Master, I now have a much easier job. My role is to chair the twice-yearly Committee Meetings (which comprise the Association Committee and District Chairmen, Masters and Representatives) and the Meetings themselves. I also support the Bell Restoration Committee and anything else which comes my way. And I ring !

This large team of dedicated people keep the wheels turning (literally!). Lend a hand. You do not have to be the most experienced ringer to take on a role ó if you fancy joining one of the Committees, have a word with an Association or District Officer; new blood is always welcome.

Queen's Tower at Imperial College



Ringing at The Queenøs Tower, Imperial College London, is very limited, largely because the bells are loud and the tower is in the middle of an active college, and partly because the bells are quite a challenge to ring due to significant tower movement. There are only about a dozen days each year when the bells are rung, mostly for Royal anniversaries (as the original donor wished) or major College occasions.

However, others do occur, most recently on 19th January when members of the MCALDG joined members of the University of London Society at their annual visit to the tower. For the last five years their ringing at the tower has formed part of the Roger Bailey Memorial Ringing in January. This year, with the number of UL ringers available being quite small the occasion was opened up to mem bers of the Middlesex Association, and around thirty people came to experience the climb and the challenge of ringing even rounds.

All those who had slogged up the 239 steps to the ringing room were given the chance to ring. However with few people present that had experience of the bells, the ringing on all ten bells, with a total weight of a little under eight tons, was limited to rounds and called changes. There were also two short touches of Grandsire Doubles on the front six bells. The ringing dates for the tower are set out on the tower page of the Middlesex Association website. Experienced ringers are welcome to come to ring.

My role as choirmaster is to book singers, preferably ringers, rehearsal space, choose repertoire, typeset the service sheet, print out scores and liaise with an organist. Choosing repertoire without previous knowledge of the level of reading and singing is difficult, and in the early years I was over-ambitious! We now have a good pool of singers, plus a ringing organist, Leigh Simpson, and we are preparing for the next service, to be held at St Dunstanøs Church, Stepney, on Tuesday, December 3rd 2019.
