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Dorothy Barker



Dorothy Barker died on 6 April 2019 in her 80th year. She was one of the MCALDG¢s longest serving members, Assistant Ringing Master from 2014 in the S&W District, and a friend of us all. Dorothy was a capable ringer, diligent about the homeworkøinvolved in learning methods. She found it difficult to hear her own bell amongst others, so relied heavily on ropesightø and place-counting. She developed her own sophisticated systems for following the pattern of the ropes, for example in multi-call 240s of Grandsire Doubles. She rang several quarter peals at Sunbury on Thames with Dennis Brock, and fittingly rang her last quarter peal on the day of Dennisø 100th birthday celebrations.

Much of Dorothy& ringing entailed supporting new and inexperienced ringers to make progress. She organised monthly practices at Cranford and, more recently, at Isleworth. Those who attended these practices have affectionate memories of her kindly guidance. She was a keen -tower collectorø keeping precise personal records, and really enjoyed ringing outings, whether hectic -topen daysø in southern counties, or in recent years outings by boat with the Twickenham ringers to Thamesside towers. Dorothy was a much loved member of the Middlesex Association, and will be missed especially by ringers in south west Middlesex.

Taking Control

Tue Sando, N&E Training Officer, reports:
On 4th May Joe Tilley ran a master class in
-Calling Call Changesøat St Anneøs, Limehouse.
Ringers from all over London and from very
different ringing levels attended. The exercises were
varied from calling to Queens or Whittingtonøs and
back, to being given a +random rowø and being
asked to call it back to rounds.

Building confidenceøis the key word in the progression of any ringer. What better way to build learnersøconfidence than teaching them to raise their voices in the ringing room and give orders to their more experienced ringers?

Calling call changes is often underestimated, but is an intermediate skill that any wedding ringers should master. Our course aimed at giving everybody the confidence to grab a rope and take control for the next couple of minutesøringing. Our ringers left with a spring in their step, eager to go back to their towers and try it out.

The rest of the year will offer many different courses, including how to memorise methods by better understanding how they are structured and a repeat of last year¢s successful calling & conducting classes with Dave Bassford.

Scouting for ringers of the future...

Keeping the bells ringing

Steve Jakeman, Bell Restoration Officer, describes the work going on behind the scenes:

Good progress has been made at **Acton**. The new wheels were raised in May in three lifts from the ground floor and now rest with the bells awaiting Whites of Appleton to fit them and also resolve the bearing problem with the 4th.

Harlington will soon be back in action. Nicholson Engineering return in June to complete the replacement of the cracked 5th through the generosity of the Keltek Bell Trust which has made available the redundant 2nd from Lindfield in Sussex.

An inspection was carried out at **St Andrew**, **Enfield**. The Parish is planning a major refurbishment of fabric and upgrade of facilities; the report will provide recommendations to ensure the bells are included in the multi-million pound vision currently being put together.

At **Sunbury on Thame**s we are providing voluntary labour to assist Taylors with the broken 2nd gudgeon. Should be lots of celebrations being planned!

At the Association AGM a grant of £15,000 to **St Mary, Hampton** was approved. The new vicar is keen to train a band after an £80,000 restoration programme.

Money makes the bells go round...

The 200 Club is the main way in which Association ringers can support the work of the Bell Restoration Fund. In the most recent year nearly £6,000 was provided by the Club to the Fund, more than half its total annual income.

A Call to Arms

Do you ever feel like your progress in ringing is two steps forward, one step back? If so I urge you to seek out a training session. I was nervous before attending at Harrow Weald on 10th March as Iøm not an experienced ringer, and the dreaded words ocall changes had been mentioned!

Our tutor David Smith addressed the fundamental handling skills required to make progress, including the importance of getting the bell up to balance and holding it there, *at either stroke*, *at any time*. Now dongt get me wrong - Igve practised these skills at my home tower, but in this training session David focused on pure handling perfection. Exercises included changing position, kaleidoscope skills, dodging, plain hunt on 3, 4, then 5 - but always being mindful of correct handling. I am now really looking forward to the next training session, even call changes!
